### **Finding our focus**

When we first started Network Delaware we had many different pillar areas aiming to serve a wide variety of different needs.

However, our members and community quickly realized we had too many areas and we needed to focus in on a smaller number to be effective.

With the support of many partners and members over the years, we continued to narrow down our programs until we got to where we are today.

Now we focus on just three areas: Leadership Development, Civic Engagement, and Policy Change. Specifically, this breaks down into: organizing training programs, the Campaign School, the Ella Baker Black Organizers Group, the Civic Action Alerts, the Change Agent Journey, support for the Delaware Call, support for the Community Policy Institute, and support for many different issue campaigns.

While the pandemic has slowed some things down, it has given us a chance to do more to hone in on these core areas listed above and make sure we are improving them as well as we can.

We still have a long way to go to reach our highest vision of what we think the Network community can do, but each year our members continue to keep pushing us there.

We want to foster a space so anyone in Delaware who wants to improve their skills and work for justice and change knows they have a supportive community willing to work with them. That's our true purpose and I'm grateful for everyone who has helped us find our path.

# Accomplishments

### Leadership Development

Officially launched the Change Agent Journey which is a tailored leadership development program where you identify key skills you want to learn (e.g. management, instituting equiting/justice within your team, pushing policy, etc.) and you work with a small group and coach to reach your learning goals. We now host sessions online and in Dover, Newark, and Wilmington.

#### **Civic Engagement**

For multiple years now have grown the Civic Action Alerts initiative. The weekly readership increased to 2,000 to 3,000 people this year and has become more consistent. We are considering how to improve the program even more in 2022 so send us your ideas and suggestions!

#### **Policy Change**

Supported the continued growth of the Community Policy Institute which is an independent, nonpartisan public policy organization that engages in comprehensive research and Delawarefocused legislation and policy. They aim to "lift up ideas that work for all of us" here in Delaware. They support issue campaigns by producing fact sheets and by training members on how to effectively support policy change.

### **Monica's Story**



One of the things I have found most fascinating about Delaware since becoming a resident of Kent County almost two years ago is how easy it is to become civically engaged.

Perhaps due to the size of the state and the overall culture, it was very easy to connect with individuals in the community striving to make a difference. Meeting with these individuals allowed me to connect with multiple civic and leadership development program.

## **2021 Metrics of Success**

Here's a look at how we track our success at the Network. These numbers look at data over 2021:

- Average Survey Ranking of "Would you recommend Network Delaware to others?"=9.65 (2020=9.5, 2019=8.71)
- Inclusive Leadership: % of individuals of color in leadership positions such as organizer, coordinator, team lead, trainers, etc.=68% (2020=68%, 2019=67%)
- # of Issue Campaigns
  Supported=7 (2020=5, 2019= 3)
- Effectiveness of volunteer engagement=8.07 (2020=8, 2019=8.2)
- Effectiveness of communications=9.15 (2020=8.6, 2019=9)






# **2021 Financial Summary**

Here's a snapshot of Network Delaware's 2021 financials:

- We raised \$217,850
- We spent \$188,806
- We have **\$85,817 in assets** (including assets from previous years)

*Note* Network Delaware's fiscally sponsored issue campaigns and projects have a separate restricted set of funds with a balance of \$39,206.



### **Kirsten's Story**

Before I attended my first Network Delaware meeting in 2017, I wasn't involved in politics or activism. Not because I didn't want to, but because I didn't know how to take the first step.

I joined a few issue campaigns and civic engagement programs, and what kept me coming back were the relationships I'd built with other members. They took me under their wing, showed me the things they'd learned as activists, and helped me to develop my own skills.

One of the things I love most about Network Delaware is the commitment to building long-term relationships, and to long-term learning. No matter your experience level, everyone has something to teach and something to learn.
